DepEd vows reduced learning disruptions with school buildings resiliency project

The Department of Education (DepEd) said Thursday it is set to implement the P30.56 billion Infrastructure for Safer and Resilient Schools (ISRS) Project, not only to ensure the recovery of disaster-affected schools, but also to reduce the disruption in the delivery of education services to learners.

This came after the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) Board, chaired by President Ferdinand Marcos Jr., on Wednesday approved the multi-billion peso project to rehabilitate and reconstruct the school facilities outside Metro Manila which were damaged by calamities from 2019 to 2023.

The DepEd said that the ISRS Project, which will be implemented from 2025 to 2029, is a "critical part" of the MATATAG agenda of Vice President and Education Secretary Sara Duterte.

According to the agency, the project is expected to benefit 4,756 school buildings, 13,101 classrooms, and around 741,038 learners in 1,282 target school beneficiaries.

The Presidential Communications Office (PCO) earlier said that of the total P30.56 billion project cost, P27.50 billion will be funded by loan proceeds, while the remaining P3.06 billion will be financed by the national government.



DOST-Cavite introduces dual drum composting system

The Department of Science and Technology (DOST) Industrial Technology Development Institute (ITDI) has unveiled a pioneering solution for efficient organic waste management called the Dual Drum Composter.

Friday, Anna Marie Daigan, senior science research specialist at DOST's Cavite Field Office, said the dual drum composting system will be heavily promoted by her office in the province.

Engineered to optimize microbial activity and expedite the decomposition process, the technology produces high-quality compost in a short time, ranging from a few weeks to several

In a phone interview on months, depending on environmental factors and waste composition, she said.

> She said widespread adoption of this innovative waste management system in local government units (LGUs) will reduce the environmental footprint of waste disposal while promoting resource efficiency and resilience in Cavite.

> "The implementation of dual drum composting by

the DOST underscores the government's unwavering commitment to sustainable development and environmental stewardship," Daigan told the Philippine News

Agency. Beyond its environmental benefits, dual drum composting offers economic advantages, particularly for agricultural communities.

By locally producing organic compost, farmers can reduce their reliance on chemical fertilizers, lowering production costs and enhancing crop yields.

Daigan said the technology is readily available through accredited manufacturers and can be customized to meet the specific needs of homeowners engaged in urban gardening initiatives, offering a costeffective solution for organic waste management. (PNA)



National Scientists and Academicians inspire CDO high schoolers at the DOST-NAST Scienteach Symposium

and several academicians from the National Academy of Science and Technology Philippines (NAST PHL) during the SCIENTEACH: Symposium for the Youth on May 07, 2024 at Mallberry Suites Hotel, Cagayan de Oro City with the support of the Department of Education Region 10 and hosted by the Department of Science and Technology Region 10.



SCIENTEACH is a forum where our country's National Scientists, Academicians, and NAST awardees share their experiences with the youth. This activity is done in selected places all over the country.

The symposium aims

Mangroves temporarily spared as public scoping for Suroyan Project is cancelled Ormoc, Leyte—The public scoping for the Ormoc Estuary Park, also known as Suroyan Project, has been cancelled for failure to comply with jurisdictional requirements. The public scoping was held on May 09, 2024 at the Barangay Gym of Brgy. Naungan, Ormoc City.

Groups that pushed for the cancellation include the Philippine Movement for Climate Justice (PMCJ), Sanlakas, Save Ormoc Bay Aggrupation (SOBA), Partido ng Lakas ng Masa (PLM), Öriang, and local fisherfolk organizations including NEFCOFA.

The proponent, Premiumlands Corporation, was reportedly unable to provide the project description for scoping (PDS), among other conditions needed such as the presentation of their Environmental Compliance Certificate and conduct of an Information and Education campaign months prior to the public scoping.

The Ormoc Estuary Park is part of the Ormoc Mega City, which will displace and disrupt an estimated 935 hectares of mangroves, including 191 hectares under the jurisdiction of DENR's Community Based Forest Management Agreement (CBMFA). This will affect at least 50 mangrove planter organizations, 500+ fisherfolk across three barangays (Lao, Naugan, and San Juan) of Ormoc Mega City, and around 3,000 families.

"We push back against these public scopings because they keep repeating the same mistake of ignoring anď requirements railroading their projects," said Fara Diva Gamalo, Eastern Visayas Chapter Convenor of PMCJ. "The Suroyan Project affects thousands of locals. These locals need to be consulted about a construction that would put their lives and livelihood in danger."

Mangroves are essential for coastal communities because they are natural defenses against waves and storms.

They also function as homes for fish, enriching the marine ecosystem and providing livelihood opportunities to locals.

Estela Vasquez, Visayas Coordinator of PMCJ, brought up the recent El Niño to show the urgency of the situation.

"We are in a climate emergency, and we just experienced one of its effects during the recent heat waves. More than ever, it is important to protect the mangrove forest and our biodiversity hotspots."

She emphasized: "Projects should be contextualized in the Local Climate Change Adaptation Plan (LCCAP), not just for recreation and commercial purposes."

Groups have demanded that the proponents and the Environmental Management Bureau (EMB) consult with the affected communities more closely for the protection of these natural resources.



Sciences Division, Academician Jaime C. Montoya, said, "I sincerely wish that this symposium will be a great avenue to knowledge, share experience, and for you to feel the excitement in pursuing science."

The lucky high schoolers were from eleven high schools in the city, namely Gusa Regional Science High School - X Misamis Oriental General Comprehensive High School. Bugo National High School, Cagayan de Oro National High School, Agusan National High School, Bulua National High School, Mambuaya National High School, Carmen National High School, Lumbia National High School, Pedro "Oloy" N. Roa National High School, and Kauswagan National High School.

Dr. Federico P. Martin, Assistant Regional Director Department of Education 10 (DepEd 10), representing Regional Director Dr. Arturo B. Bayocot, CESO III, said in his message, "This is good, what DOST has done for our learners. It would certainly be memorable for these learners as an encouragement to become scientists. What we need today are workers in the field of science."

During the symposium's morning session, DOST – 10 Regional Director Engr. Romela N. Ratilla shared with the students the DOST programs for students that they can avail of while pursuing their careers in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

Among them are the scholarship opportunities, DOST including undergraduate scholarships, the RA 7687, and Merit Scholarships that they can apply for and take the qualifying exam in their 12th grade of Senior High School. They can also apply for the Junior Level Science Scholarship (JLSS) in their 2nd-year

college, provided they are regular incoming 3rd year. Currently, Northern Mindanao has a total of 1,452 ongoing undergraduate scholars who are studying in various universities and

colleges in the region. National Scientist Dr Lourdes J. Cruz's message is that chemistry is fun. She shared her experiences in studying conotoxins from the venom of Conus marine snails that can act as biological probes in analyzing the activities of our brains.

Academician Jose Maria P. Balmaceda talked about the applications of theoretical mathematics in his exciting talk "Curious Curves: The Joys of Math." Students were educated and entertained by his catchy phrases, such as "Okay lang na hindi straight," while he shared his joy in studying the curves we can find in nature and their applications.

Academician Gil Jacinto shared how he became an oceanographer while completing a degree in chemistry. He encouraged the students to take up marine science and become oceanographers, as there are only five of them in the Philippines, and our country is archipelagic, with 70% water. Researchers can do many things in ocean research, marine diversity, and climate change.

Students who plan to pursue an engineering degree were also inspired by Academician Aura C. Matias when she shared ner profession as an Industrial Engineer. She highlighted that an Industrial Engineer is vital and works constantly behind every industry.

Academician Maribel G. Nonato, like NS Cruz and Acad. Jacinto shared her work in chemistry with the students, particularly in natural products. She shared with the high schoolers her research on the Phytochemistry and Biological Activities of Philippine-grown species of the Genus Pandanus and its metabolites as potential for medicinal applications.

Lastly, Academician Elmer P. Dadios, a pioneer in robotics, actively shared with the listeners his works on Robotics at De La Salle University and how amusing it is to study Artificial Intelligence and Robotics. He highlighted that most of their work is a product of having fun developing robots.

"During the event, I was mesmerized, amazed, and inspired by the National Scientist Lourdes J. Cruz when I asked her, 'What is the first step of becoming a National Scientist?' She told me, 'You should not fear trying," said Sam David Anthony C. Casino, a Grade 11 Lumbia National High School student.

Students actively participated and enjoyed the activity. The students asked intelligent questions even during lunch time, took pictures with the scientists, and requested autographs.

SČIENTEACH is an activity organized by NAST PHL to inspire and encourage students to pursue careers in science, technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). NAST is an attached agency of DOST that has an advisory function to the President of the Philippines. National Scientists and Academicians all over the country are organized into six divisions. NAST's current Executive Director is Dr Luningning Samarita Domingo, and the NAST PHL President is Academician Jaime C. Montoya.

Despite a recent injury, Leonard Grospe lived up to his billing as the country's top male high jumper, winning the event in 2.18 meters in the International Container Terminal Services, Inc. (ICTSI) Philippine Athletics Championships at PhilSports in Pasig City late Friday.

Pasig City's Kent Brian Celeste (2.11m) finished second, followed by teammate Ernie Calipay (2.09m).

"I am so happy that I reached that height and hit the silver medal standard in the SEA (Southeast Asian) Games," Grospe said in an interview Saturday.

He got injured while competing at the Singapore Open last month. He placed third (2.14m) behind Chinese Taipei's Fu Chao-Hsuan (2.22m) and Tsai Wei-Chih (2.18m).

"I feel very proud that I'm still at my peak. Even if my left ankle is painful, I was able to perform," Grospe, the pride of Mapua University, said.

The 6-foot-1 Grospe holds the Philippine record of 2.20m, which he established at the Philippine National Games in the same venue last year. He broke the 17-yearold mark of 2.17m set by his coach, Sean Guevarra. In the Under-20

category, Ateneo de Manila University's Airex Gabriel Villanueva topped the men's shot put for his second gold medal.

The 19-year-old from Bacolod City, Negros Occidental won in 14.05 meters, beating teammate Nicolas Marco Nieto (12.94) and Santa Rosa City, Laguna's Lander Josh Arban (12:55).

Villanueva's first gold came from discus throw (42.96m) on Thursday. Perpetual Help's Bernard Generosa Jr. (40.04m) got the silver while University of Baguio's Denver Tacay (39.41) took the bronze. "I am thankful for

winning again," the 5-foot-10 Villanueva said.

Thailand's Sawitree Kaewsukri (51.50m), Sabah Athletics Association's Aillna Thipong Ak Laga (46.27m) and University of Santo Tomas' Joana Marie Bandal (40.13m) were the top three finishers in the women's hammer throw of the tournament supported by the Philippine Sports Commission. **(PNA)**

risks. Meanwhile, the session on current good manufacturing practices (cGMP) addressed a comprehensive range of topics, including GMP organization, staff education and training, premises, plant construction and design, equipment, sanitation and hygiene, supervision, facilities, sanitary maintenance and process sanitation, control, chemical control, quality management, testing of reprocessed products, testing of returned goods, laboratory facilities and control, documentation,

quality audits, warehouse and distribution, receiving and shipping, recall and traceability, sample retention. and subcontracting of manufacturing.

Throughout the discussions, the emphasis on continuous improvement and adherence to regulatory requirements was highlighted as critical components of maintaining a safe and efficient food production environment.


It was also stressed that regular monitoring and evaluation of all aspects of the operation are essential to ensuring compliance safety with food standards.
