EDITORIAL

Empowering folks who fish

nless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not." -- Dr. Seuss

Fish is one of the staple food sources of our countrymen. Small scale capture fisherfolk (people who fish in the open) or aquaculture groups produce a large portion of local fish sources. Unfortunately, many of them face a constant struggle to sustain their livelihood. It is therefore an existential imperative that they be empowered to ensure their survival. Yet, very few people know of the plight of the folks who fish for a living.

Recently, former Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources (BFAR) Director Nestor Domenden who now heads the Philippine Council for Agriculture and Fisheries (PCAF), invited me to a meeting with some groups of fisherfolk and officials of Municipal Fisheries and Aquatic Resources Management Councils (MFARMC).

FARMCs in every city, municipality and barangays abutting municipal waters, bays, lakes, rivers and dams were created by law to encourage participation by small fisherfolk and small- scale fisheries owner associations in plans and actual project implementation affecting their industry. Standard protocol in government is that projects that assist the small fisherfolk be coursed through member associations of the FARMCs.

The problem with the aforesaid standard protocol is that generally, associations who are recipients of government projects for livelihood are not able to sustain the projects after the infusion of funds or assets. After the initial phase, the project often lapses into a coma till the next infusion. This occurs because associations unaided are not trained to run the project and make it profitable.

Associations are by their very nature nonstock and non-profit organizations. Without

proper training and without tweaking the organization, the projects experience difficulty in making it sustainable. In addition, the implementing government agencies are run by government people who have often never run a business in their lives. As such, the protocol as it is, needs additional elements to give these government projects a chance to become sustainable.

During the meeting with this particular groups of FARMCs, however, I was able to meet a FARMC with a success story. In the municipality of Bolinao in the province of Pangasinan, there is a cove filled with fish cages. Many of these fish cages are owned by entrepreneurs or businessmen. Some of these fish cages, however, are owned by a fisherfolk association assisted by the FARMC here.

Initially they were given a few pieces of fish cages and given seven fishing cycles to turn a profit and return the cost of the fish cages. The fisherfolk were able to turn a profit and pay for the fish cages in just one cycle. Encouraged by their success, the fisherfolk association was able to partner with a private corporation who angel invested in the association's additional fish cage project under a joint venture.

The relative success story of the fisherfolk of Bolinao shows how proper empowerment of the folks of fish can both help improve the lot of the ordinary fisherfolk and improve food production capability.

How can we replicate the Bolinao experience?

First, citizens must support the right people in key government positions in middle management who have the ability to properly utilize government assets, can work with both the stakeholders and private entities and see the big picture. Ordinary citizens must go out of their way and find ways to support these capable officials. Officials like PFAC director Domenden must be harnessed and placed in the right positions

Second, local and national government units must work hand in hand with the FARMC in their areas to provide the proper opportunities for these associations. Areas must be set aside exclusively for these associations to set up their projects and incentives must be granted. The associations must be protected from preying middlemen and predatory big businesses and allowed to grow.

Third, professionals and private individuals must go out, capacitate and help these associations. The Bolinao fisherfolk were taught by private individuals how to run the project like a business cooperative with an eye for profit. A private corporation provided them with capital and assets and inputs for additional fish cage projects and only asked for 20 percent of the net profits. If more social enterprises are set up and partner with these small- scale food producing associations, this story can be replicated. Perhaps, professionals of a certain age who are winding down their careers can go out and pitch in and help with their core competencies. These associations need entrepreneurs, marketing experts, finance people, and of course, aggressive lawyers to protect them.

Finally, the ordinary citizens can help make the plight of the fisherfolk and others like them be known by setting aside some of their social media time and supporting these stories. Perhaps, if their stories are told over and over again, enough people can come together to truly empower them.

This is just my oblique observation. Editor's note: The opinions expressed in the

As the statutory receiver, the PDIC sells closed bankowned assets through public bidding and negotiated sales. Proceeds from the liquidation of closed banks' properties are added to the pool of liquid assets of these banks for distribution to uninsured depositors and other creditors subject to the rules on concurrence and preference of credits. PEZA engages Japanese SMEs to attract more investors in PH

OSAKA, Japan -- "In partnership with the Okayama International **Business Association** (OIBA), Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA) and the Philippine Trade and Investment Center (PTIC) in Osaka engaged around 30,000 Japanese SMEs to invest in the Philippines that will be vital in boosting the Philippines' manufacturing supply chain and industrial ecosystem," stated PEZA OIC Director General Tereso O. Panga following the successful conduct of the investment mission in Osaka and Okayama, Japan last 07-09 December 2022.

PEZA delegation headed by OIC Director General Panga, together with the Philippine Trade and Investment Center (PTIC) in Osaka led by Commercial Counsellor Michael Ignacio, have recently concluded a three-day mission in Osaka & Okayama in hopes to attract more Japanese investors to the Philippines.

With the goal to contribute to achieving the upper middle-income status as the year 2022 comes to an end, PEZA continues its efforts to aggressively

This mission is in preparation also for PBBM's state visit to Japan in February 2023, which will coincide with the celebration of Japan+ASEAN 50th year of partnership. Meanwhile, a group of Okayama business delegation will visit the Philippines by first quarter next year to

explore investment opportunities in the ecozones.

OIC Panga noted, "With Japan's SMEs as the lifeblood of this country's massive economy, comprising 99.7% of all businesses, we can take advantage of these SMEs by putting up operations in the Philippines, help complete the supply chain, empower our own SMEs, and boost the country's industrial ecosystem."

Aside from this, PEZA also engaged in several business-to-business-to-business-to-business and government meetings during the mission to strengthen its investment promotion initiatives and promote the Philippines as the best choice for investors especially in Southeast Asia.

PEZA and PTIC Osaka met with the Osaka Chamber of Commerce and Industry (OCCI), Osaka Business Development Agency (OBDA), Osaka Prefectural Government (OPG), and the Okayama International **Business Association** (OIBA) to explore areas for investment promotion collaborations and in strengthening the Philippine-Japan partnership in various areas such as the World Expo 2025 to be held in Kansai, Osaka, Japan.

PEZA met with Junca Holdings to discuss their upcoming bio-technology activity to be registered with PEZA. Likewise, partner companies of Junca Holdings such as Synergy and Global Network Japan are also exploring the possibility of putting up a tourism economic zone and an anaerobic / waste-to-energy water treatment plant in the Philippines through PEZA.

Moreover, Shibutani Shoten Corporation, a manufacturer of car seat, arm rest, and headrest covers for big car companies such as Mitsubishi and Mazda, met with PEZA to discuss its plans of putting up a company in the Philippines to support its employment and training program for Filipino workers and expand its brand to the international market.

In terms of expansion, Marukame Trading Co., Ltd. seeks to hire 100 additional employees to their Philippine company, Marukame Fashion Cebu Inc., a 100% exportmanufacturer of highend and global apparel brands located in Mactan Economic Zone.

VALTES Co., Ltd. is also looking at

expanding the operations of VALTES Advanced Technology Inc., a PEZA-registered IT company into software design and development, to cater to their plans of employing additional 100 software engineers.

Meanwhile, Nakashima Propeller Co., Ltd., a global industry leader in the manufacture of marine equipment such as sea vessel propellers, rudders, and shafts, is planning to bring in new technology and incorporating innovation to its plants worldwide, particularly in its facility in the Cavite Economic Zone.

Moreover, Inabata Philippines Inc., a leading ecozone logistics provider, is looking at expand its warehouse footprint in the next 2 years to cater to its client ecozone locators nationwide.

Showa Spring Co. Ltd., with a PEZA-registered export manufacturing enterprise in Mactan Economic Zone, is also scouting a separate location in the CALABARZON area for the expansion project of its operations in the Philippines.

Positive outlook to increase Japanese investments

With the successful mission, PEZA expects to increase number of Japanese locator companies within its ecozones and create stronger partnerships to promote the Philippines as the smart choice for strategic and big-ticket investments.

"We echo the call of the government and our investors that the Philippines is the smart investment choice in the region. This is the best time to invest in the Philippines," expressed the PEZA Interim Chief.

To date, there are a total of 891 Japanese enterprises registered in PEZA and located in various PEZA ecozones nationwide. These

companies contribute PhP 746.093 Billion of investments from 1995 to November 2022. The Japanese remain the top investors in PEZA comprising 27.52% of its total investments.

PBBM leaves tonight to participate in ASEAN-EU Commemorative Summit in Belgium

CALOOCAN CITY, (PIA) -- President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. is set to leave the country tonight to participate in the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN)-European Union (EU) Commemorative Summit Commemorative Summit in Brussels, Belgium.

In a pre-departure briefing on Friday, Department of Foreign Affairs (DFA) Assistant Secretary Daniel Espiritu said, the President will meet with the business community and have one-on-one meetings

with corporations looking to expand their presence in the Philippines.

Espiritu said, apart from one-on-one meetings, there will also be a meeting with the business sector within the framework of the ASEAN-EU dialogue partnership relations.

The President is expected to participate at the C-Suite or CEO Suite Luncheon for the EU-ASEAN Business Summit and at the 10th ASEAN-EU Business Summit during his trip to Belgium where he is

expected to deliver his remarks at these two events.

"This will be a very busy trip for the President, and we hope that this will redound to a lot of benefits for the Filipino people, not only for ASEAN," Espiritu said.

He said business meetings on the sidelines of the ASEAN)-EU Commemorative Summit will yield more investments and jobs for Filipinos as the President will have the opportunity to expand on trade and investment policies during the business

roundtable with the EU and European corporations.

Espiritu said there would also be networking among Filipino and European businessmen.

"Hopefully, for this networking, the Filipino businessmen will be able to come up with deals with their European counterparts," he said.

On the President's meeting with multinational consumer goods company, Unilever, the DFA official described it as vital since the firm intends to establish a new state-of-the-art

manufacturing facility for personal care products in Cavite province.

"So expansion of investments ito 'no to the tune of P4.7 billion. Now it is expected to generate at least 130 projected employment for the Philippines," Espiritu said.

The chief executive is also expected to meet with a shipbuilding and navigation and logistics company that seeks to develop a shipyard with an investment of P1.5 billion, which will create 500 to 600 direct and indirect jobs.

An infrastructure and

renewable energy company, which intends to invest in the renewable energy sector in the Philippines, would also meet one-on-one with the President.

The chief executive is also expected to meet with a wholesale market and international logistics h u b m a n a g e m e n t company which intends to establish agrologistics at the New Clark City that will build and operate a wholesale market for fresh products with an organized and efficient food supply and value chain. Letran claims NCAA 3-peat

MANILA — San Juan De Letran won its third NCAA men's basketball title after drubbing College of St. Benilde (CSB), 81-67, in the rubber match of their best-of-three finals on Sunday night at the sold-out Ynares Center in Antipolo City.

The Knights broke loose in the second quarter, outscoring the

Blazers, 27-12, to open a 51-33 halftime lead before holding their opponents off in the second half.

King Caralipio led Letran, which last tasted a three-peat in 1984 when a Larry Albanocoached squad led by Samboy Lim capped its o w n threechampionship run that began in 1982, with 20 points, 10 rebounds, and two assists.

Caralipio would go on to win the Finals Most Valuable Player award after averaging 15.0 points, 8.0 rebounds, and 2.0 assists for the entire series.

Fellow graduating student Brent Paraiso added 16 points, three rebounds, two assists, one steal, and two blocks as he stepped up in the absence of graduating star Fran Yu, who served his onegame suspension in the decider.

Miggy Corteza led CSB, which missed out on bringing the NCAA title back to Taft Avenue after 22 years, with 14 points, seven rebounds, one block, and two steals in a game where

main men Will Gozum and Migs Oczon went cold.

Saddled by early foul trouble, Gozum only had 10 points, two rebounds, one block, and one steal while committing three turnovers.

Worse, Gozum was

sent off after a late headbutt to rival big man Pao Javillonar while going for a rebound off Oczon's missed three.

Oczon only went 2for-11 from beyond the arc and only had nine points with seven rebounds, one assist, and two steals. (PNA)

Cainta swimmer wins 3rd gold in PSC-Batang Pinoy

BANTAY, Ilocos Sur—Aubrey Tom of Rizal province clocked 5:31.10 to rule the 400-meter Individual Medley event in the girls' 13-15 years old category and emerged as the first triple-gold winner in the Philippine Sports Commission-Batang Pinoy National Championships at the Quirino Stadium here on Sunday.

The 15-year-old swimmer from Cainta town also dominated the 100-meter freestyles and the 200-meter individual medley (IM) last Saturday.

"I'm happy to win three gold medals despite my limited preparation," said Tom, who won two gold medals (50m freestyle and 200m butterfly) and two silver medals (200m and 400m Individual Medley) in the UAAP last month.

She took a one-week break after the UAAP and resumed training for the Batang Pinoy only two weeks ago.

Tom, a Grade 10 student from the University of the Philippines Integrated School in Quezon City, debuted at the 2019 Batang Pinoy in Palawan where she pocketed five gold medals coming from the 50m and 100m freestyle, 50m butterfly, 50m backstroke and 200m Individual Medley. In the same year, she became a member of the national junior team which saw action at the 43rd Southeast Asian Age Group Swimming Championships in Cambodia.

Tom has been a member of the Cainta Alpha Dragons team since she was five years old. She started training under Marichi Gandionco, the head coach of the Rising Atlantis Swim Club last Dec. 1.

Meanwhile, Kristian Yugo Cabana of Lucena and Kyla Louise Bulaga of La Union pocketed their second gold medals, respectively.

Cabana, a seventh grader from International School for Better Beginnings, registered 1:5.40 topped the boys' 12 and under 100m butterfly event in 1:5.40 to claim his second gold medal after winning the 200m IM on Saturday.

Bulaga grabbed her second gold medal in the girls' 12 and under category after clocking 1:12.70 in the 100m butterfly event. She had earlier won the $200m\,\text{IM}$ event.

In athletics, Sophia Angela Mae Dela Vega of San Jose City (Nueva Ecija) won the girls long jump in 4.77 meters. Jesalyn Materdan of Masbate (4.52) took the silver medal and Angelica Jane Balason of Quezon City (4.37) settled for the bronze medal.

In the boys' discus throw event, Prince Charles Branzuela of Masbate copped the gold medal in 31.95 meters, beating Cyrihl Teves of Davao del Norte (30.69) and Yul Tristan Tumamak of Maasin City (Leyte), who submitted 29.41 meters. (PNA)
