Bataan-Cavite bridge project done by 2030 – DPWH

The Bataan-Cavite bridge, which will be the longest bridge in the country once completed, is projected to be finished by 2030, according to Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) chief Manuel Bonoan.

Once done, Bonoan said the project will also be one of the longest bay bridge in the world as it spans 32 kilometers.

The bridge will be longer than the 8.9-kilometer Cebu-Cordova Bridge and the 2.1-kilometer San Juanico Bridge.

"I was just informed that the timeframe for completion of this major bridge project will be sometime 2030 or so," Bonoan said in a Senate hearing tackling the DPWH project when asked about it by his predecessor and now senator Mark Villar.

The bridge project starts from Barangay Alas-asin in Mariveles, Bataan, crosses Manila Bay, and ends at Barangay Timalan in Naic, Cavite.

"Bataan-Cavite Interlink Bridge will be the second longest bay bridge in the world once constructed," Bonoan noted. (By: John Eric Mendoza)

Phase 1 of LRT-1 Cavite Extension on track to open before Christmas

The first phase of the LRT-1 Cavite Extension is on track to open before Christmas, according to Department of Transportation (DOTr) Secretary Jaime Bautista on Friday.

The first phase will connect Baclaran Station in Pasay City to Dr. Santos Station in Paranaque City, which Bautista inspected along with Department of Finance Chief Ralph Recto, Parañaque 1st District Rep. Edwin Olivarez, and officials of Light Rail Manila Corp. (LRMC).

It is expected to serve upon opening.

"With 50,000 passengers passing through this, mababawasan yung sasakay sa private cars and other public utility vehicles (we expect that the number of private cars and public utility vehicles will decrease) so that will really contribute to solving some of the traffic problems," said Bautista.

Bautista said this will also make the Parañaque Integrated Terminal Exchange (PITX) and the Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA) more accessible to the public since there will now be stations located in those

"Kasi right now it's also difficult to go to PITX. For up to 50,000 passengers—you to go there, you have to ride a bus or a taxi or UV Express. But with this line stopping in PITX, it will really improve accessibility and comfort to the traveling public. And (to the) airport also," added Bautista.

The DOTr said the same LRT-1 fare matrix will apply, meaning riding from Baclaran to Dr. Santos Station will cost P25.

The Dr. Santos Station in

Parañaque will also have an intermodal transport facility to make it easier for passengers to catch a ride to and from the station.

"We'll be putting up a jeepney here, and UV Express, at pinag-aaralan din natin magkaroon ng bus line. This will be a duplicate of the PITX, ganun ang mangyayari, said Parañaque 1st District Rep. Edwin Olivarez.

Meanwhile, **LRMC** General Manager Enrico Benipayo said some rightof-way issues still need to be addressed before they can begin construction of Phase 2 and Phase 3 of the project.

I have read some comments from Pi Network pioneers and 90% of them are very positive. I can see that you are smart and understand my views very well. However, I have noticed that some pioneers have a narrowminded approach to thinking. Let me correct them.

* I read one pioneer said after OM, the price will increase significantly. This will encourage many pioneers who hold 20,000 Pi to invest in corporations, real estate, etc. This could potentially create wars and social stability problems and Pi Network will become a crime against humanity. He want Dr. Nicolas have a solution for this concerns

- My answer: After the launch of OM, the price of GCV will remain stable and not increase significantly. This is because Pi will be a currency that is meant to be stable and widely used. That is why we propose to set the price at \$314,159, which will remain relatively stable with only minimal increases for possibly more than a hundred

- I believe most pioneers are at the bottom of society and lack the ability to manage large corporations or invest in real estate. Some pioneers said GCV is impossible because too many pioneers can buy a city or even a country. In my opinion, this kind of thinking reflects a poverty mentality. Although there are many wealthy people in the world, it is rare to see anyone buying a city or country. Additionally, even if someone had the financial means to do so, it is unlikely that a city or country would be available for purchase.

Furthermore, while it is true that one can buy stocks in a corporation, there are regulations regarding how much shares one can hold. As for real property, do you need to buy a lot while you only need one or maximum two residence to live? Do you need to invest a lot in real property which will incur a lot of property tax and management fees if you don't live and don't rent out? Of course If you have the ability and interest for rental business, you can purchase several. This can help the real estate industry if they have been stuck and cannot sell out. And this is an example that Pi can help the economy. Or maybe it's better you can donate your Pi for charity so that you can relax and let others to take care.

Wealth is like a double-edged sword, with both advantages and disadvantages. It

can kill people, but it can also provide protection. The key difference lies in the intentions of the person who possesses it. Therefore, why do some people believe that wealth brings war and society stability problems? In my opinion, if we have big heart and we have our wisdom, wealth can help our society remain stable and develop well, and can even help to resolve many issues.

- How can Pi help the economy and society? You can use the Pi to invest in some good projects for people and society but not for profit or you can invest in education or donate as a charity. So you can help your city and country people and government. The excess Pi that you don't use can be locked up for hundreds of years.

* Some pioneers ask how to liquidate Pi and who will pay us FIAT when we sell Pi when OM when the price GCV so high.

- My answer: It's an interesting point you bring up. If you hold Pi, you can buy anything with Pi, so why would you need to convert it to FIAT, which is often devalued? It's possible that many people will want to buy Pi with their FIAT due to FIAT inflation. After OM, there may be a large demand for Pi and many pioneers may still want to sell. This could be because at the early stage of OM, the ecosystem may not cover everything pioneers need, so there may be a demand to sell PI to get FIAT. However, after more companies join in and the ecosystem covers all industries, pioneers may reduce their interest in exchanging Pi for FIAT.

- Who will buy our Pi? After the OM with stable GCV price, many companies, organizations, or governments will need Pi Network's most advanced public blockchain and WEB 3.0 technology. They will need to buy Pi from us to pledge it to use our blockchain. Since Pi's price is stable and we have a strong ecosystem, they will be

assured to join in because there is no risk.

- As I said earlier, they won't find GCV \$314,159 expensive because it is a currency, not an asset. If you hold asset or products, you will use it up or if you sell, the selling price will dramatically drop. That's why you can say it is expensive. But Pi is already a currency. When they spend \$314,159 to buy one Pi, they can use one Pi to pay for pledge fees or products worth \$314,159. This is called purchase power is \$314,159! We should say GCV \$314,159 is very powerful instead of expensive! If the price is \$314, they need to buy 100 Pi to pay the same value of pledge fees and products. So actually they still need to pay \$314,159 FIAT to get the same level of service or

Actually, it's very easy to understand. But I find that many pioneers cannot understand. I know that most pioneers don't have much economic and financial education. But I hope that if you don't understand, you can be humble and take the time to study.

Remember, knowledge is power! I hope those who still don't understand can study more and gain more knowledge so that you can have more power.

Pioneers should rest assured that Pi Network is steadily moving forward, preparing for the Open Mainnet, when hundreds of Pi coin projects will serve the global community, opening up opportunities for trade and economic development on an international scale.

However, we must also be cautious of those who constantly complain and criticize the project. These people are not only undermining the community's trust but are also secretly supporting other projects. They have to speak ill of Pi Network for their own personal gain, trying to lure pioneers to follow them and serve their own interests.

PhilHealth outpatient program piloted for 49 health units in Quezon

The Philippine Health Insurance Corporation-Calabarzon (PhilHealth-4A) has launched a pilot program for its Primary Care Provider Network (PCPN) in 49 rural health units (RHUs) in Quezon province.

At the "Kapihan sa Bagong Pilipinas" forum held Tuesday at St. Jude Hotel and Event Center in Tayabas City, Dr. Edwin Oriña, acting regional vice president of PhilHealth, announced the initiative dubbed "Konsultasyong Sulit at Tama," or "Konsulta," which aims to set a model for primary care provision through the PCPN.

The PCPN is targeting 490,000 individuals across the 49 RHUs in the province.

The Konsulta program provides comprehensive outpatient benefits as mandated by the Universal Health Care Law, including consultations, health risk screenings, assessments, selected laboratory and diagnostic tests, and specific drugs and medicines.

Under the Konsulta regular scheme, a set amount of money is allocated after the patient first encounter (capitation) to cover anticipated healthcare costs for each patient.

In the PCPN model, this capitation is frontloaded, allowing facilities to

address patient needs, whether they are sick or processed.

Oriña also discussed future plans for creating a Health Care Provider Network (HCPN), which will include a range of primary to tertiary care providers, both public and private.

The HCPN will introduce the PhilHealth GAMOT program, which stands for Guaranteed Accessible Medication for Outpatient

Treatment. This initiative will provide patients with well, without waiting for access to 53 types of drugs the funding to be valued at PHP9,000 annually.

> Oriña said the HCPN will be established in Quezon later this year, with a similar rollout planned for Laguna in 2025.

The PhilHealth Konsulta program aims safeguard Filipinos' health by preventing chronic illnesses, detecting complications early, and offering affordable medications. (PNA)

Para tanker Gawilan 3rd in heats, enters finals in Paris

The six athletes who competed at the just-concluded Paris Paralympics will receive a heroes' welcome from President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr.

Archer Agustina Bantiloc, taekwondo jin Allain Ganapin, wheelchair racer Jerrold Mangliwan, javelin thrower Cendy Asusano, and swimmers Angel Otom and Ernie Gawilan are scheduled to arrive on Tuesday.

They will make a courtesy call at Malacañang Palace in Manila on Thursday at 2:30 p.m.

"Our President is very supportive who acknowledges and recognizes the efforts of our athletes," Philippine Paralympic Committee president Michael Barredo said in a news release from the Philippine Sports Commission (PSC) on Monday.

President Marcos also honored the athletes who joined the Olympics last month.

"We express our gratitude to the President for his all-out support. Our Chief Executive made us feel really special," Barredo said.

"Our para athletes did their best at the Paris Paralympics but fell short of reaching the podium. We are proud of their valiant efforts, nonetheless. Now, it is

Agustina time to return to the wondo jin drawing board and wheelchair establish a clear para sports pathway, from grassroots participation -- especially among the youth and women -- up to the elite level," he added.

The PSC fully supported the training and participation of the six Paralympians.

Asusano finished fourth in the F54 event where she registered a personal best of 15.05 meters; Otom made the finals of her two events -- placing fifth in the women's 50meter butterfly S5 event with a personal-best of 45.78 seconds, and sixth in the 50m backstroke S5 with a time of 44s – while Gawilan ranked sixth in the 400m freestyle S7 finals; Mangliwan made the 400meter T52 finals; Bantiloc lost in the opening knockout round of the women's individual compound event; and Ganapin lost in the men's K44 -80kg round of 16.

During the opening ceremony, the Philippines was acknowledged as a country that awards huge monetary incentives to medal-winning para athletes.

"We are working with Congress to increase the cash incentives of our medal-winning para athletes similar to the incentives that our athletes in the Olympics normally receive," PSC chair Richard Bachmann said.

"We are also helping institutionalize the Para PNG (Philippine National Games), so we can have a younger pool of athletes that we can actually select in the future." he said.

Vicente, Education Program Supervisor under the Curriculum and Learning Management Division (CLMD) of DepEd-Cordillera, said in an interview on Tuesday that 12 elementary and secondary schools in the region have opened their "Special Program for the Arts" (SPA) – two in Baguio City; four in Kalinga; one in Abra; one in Mountain Province; one in Tabuk City; and three in Benguet.

New Solaire casino expected to open in Cavite in 2028

Tycoon Enrique Razon is expected to open a new casino in Cavite in 2028 as the government banks on the opening of more integrated resorts to boost the local gaming industry.



Bloomberry's Solaire Resort and Casino is located in the Entertainment City.

During the Inside Asian Gaming Summit on Tuesday, Philippine Amusement and Gaming Corp. (PAGCOR) chairman and CEO Alejandro Tengco said the agency is seeing more industry players investing in the Philippines amid the country's unique selling point as a prime tourism and entertainment destination.

Tengco said at least six integrated resorts, or resort properties that include a hotel with casino and other facilities for retail and dining, will rise over the term of the Marcos administration.

"By 2025, one will be launched in the Entertainment City area, as well as other potential projects in Cebu and Boracay by 2026," Tengco said.

"Clark, the economic zone in Central Luzon, is also on the radar for a new integrated resort in 2027, followed by another Solaire property resort sometime in the end of

In particular, the Solaire Puerto Azul in Cavite will be Razon's third casino after Solaire in Parañaque and the recently opened \$1-billion integrated resort in Quezon

Other than the timeline, Tengco has yet to provide specific details on the planned Solaire casino.

"If you will just be in the province, and you'll set up one, you have to have an vestment of at least \$300 million," Tengco said.


