Cavite Governor Distributes Incentives to BHWs and BNSs

The Provincial Government of Cavite, under the leadership of Governor Athena Bryana Tolentino, distributed incentives for Barangay Health Workers (BHWs) and Barangay Nutrition Scholars (BNSs) for the third and fourth quarters of 2024. The ceremonial turnover of cheques amounting to ?24,480,000 for BHWs and ?9,384,000 for BNSs was held on December 4, 2024, at the Tagaytay International Convention Center in Tagaytay City.

Santos visited the Accelerating Salt Research and Innovation (ASIN) Center on December 11, 2024, at PSU Binmaley Campus, Binmaley, Pangasinan.





ASIN Center was established under the DOST- Niche Centers in the Regions (NICER) Program. It is a center that focuses on developing new and innovative salt production methods, improving existing processes, and identifying new markets for salt.

(DOST) Region 2, through its Science and Technology Information and Promotion Unit, conducted a two-day Enhancing Science Communication Training Program on December 9–10, 2024, at the NGN Gran Hotel in Tuguegarao City. The event aimed to enhance disaster preparedness, improve public awareness, and strengthen science communication strategies. It was attended by information officers, Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) members from various municipalities in the region, and members of the agency's S&T pen.

Day 1: Disaster Preparedness and Visual Design

Storm Surge and Flood Forecasting in the Gran Main Hall, Engr. Romeo B. Ganal, a Weather Specialist from DOST PAGASA, delivered an in-depth discussion on storm surge

and flood forecasting systems for LGUs. Engr. Ganal, speaking virtually, provided detailed explanations of storm surge warnings and the tropical cyclone warning system. He emphasized the importance of accurate interpretation of weather



advisories to effectively mitigate disaster risks.

Simultaneously, Mr. James Karl Agpalza, a Graphic Designer and Faculty member from CSU-Aparři, facilitated a workshop on Basic Visual Design and Software Tools for the S&T pen. Participants were introduced to the fundamentals of graphic design, including font selection, color, and design elements. Mr. Agpalza also provided hands-on training on tools such as Photopea and Photoshop, stressing the importance of consistent practice to create visually impactful

materials. Day 2: Geological Hazards and Science Communication

The second day of the training focused on geological hazards and the importance of science

communication in disaster risk reduction: Understanding Geological Hazards Engr. Jayferson Mabborang, Supervising SRS of PSTO Cagayan, delivered a comprehensive presentation earthquakes, volcanoes, and their associated risks. Addressing LGU participants, he underscored the significance understanding the region's geological landscape to improve disaster preparedness resilience.

In another session, Dr. Rocela Angelica Gorospe, Provincial Director of PSTO Quirino, facilitated an engaging discussion on the Science Communication Agenda and Framework. Through interactive workshops, members of the pen developed S&T

essential skills such as crafting communication personas, handling interview scenarios, and tailoring messages for effective public outreach. PD Gorospe emphasized the critical role of science communication in promoting disaster resilience and its importance for agency employees.

The two-day program also featured open forums, allowing participants to interact with experts, ask questions, and address pressing concerns. This initiative reaffirms DOST R02's commitment to fostering safer and smarter communities across Cagayan Valley by leveraging science, technology, and effective communication as essential tools for disaster preparedness resilience.



NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN TO THE PUBLIC THAT This DEED made and entered into this 09 December 2024 in Bacoor City, Philippines, by and among: CARL KRISTIAN MEJIA DOMAOAL (only sibling-brother of deceased), of legal age, Filipino citizen, single, and resident of Wood Estate Village II, Brgy. Molino III, Bacoor City, Cavite, Philippines, hereinafter referred to as the HEIR; WITNESSETH: THAT WHEREAS, on September 28, 2017, the HEIR, along with his only sibling, his brother GABRIEL MEJIA DOMAOAL, a minor who was then acting through his legal guardian, executed a "Deed of Extrajudicial Settlement of Estate with Sale" in order to extrajudicially settle the estate of their father, the late FERDINAND B. Said property was then co-owned by three (3) registered co-owners, the deceased father FERDINAND, and the brothers CARL KRISTIAN and GABRIEL, all surnamed DOMAOAL, at 1/3 each; WHEREAS, the processing of the said "Deed of Extrajudicial Settlement of Estate with Sale" was put on hold, and the title is not yet transferred to the vendee (CHRISTINE T. MILLENDEZ), despite payment of the BIR and transfer taxes, and the issuance of the Certificate Authorizing Registration, considering that GABRIEL MEJIA DOMAOAL was still minor at the time, and it was deemed proper that CARL KRISTIAN and vendee CHRISTINE would wait for GABRIEL to come to majority/ legal age to confirm the sale of his 1/3 portion (25 square meters) and the portion (12.5 square meters) he inherited from his deceased father FERDINAND. However, before coming to majority/legal age (actually, he was 16 years old), GABRIEL passed away due to lingering illness ("cancer") on April 28, 2024, in San Diego, California, U.S.A.; WHEREAS, GABRIEL MEJIA DOMAOAL, at the time of his death (April 28, 2024), was unmarried, without any issue, all his ascendants (parents) have already passed away, thus, leaving his sibling, only brother CARL KRISTIAN MEJIA DOMAOAL, as his SOLE HEIR, the only surviving collateral relative entitled to succeed to his ESTATE; however, the HEIR realizes that GABRIEL has NO ESTATE left behind, the only property he owned was his 1/ 3 portion (25 square meters) and the portion (12.5 square meters) he inherited from his deceased father FERDINAND, and this was already conveyed to the vendee (CHRISTINE T. MILLENDEZ) by way of the aforementioned "Deed of Extrajudicial Settlement of Estate with Sale". marking our GCV CT goal for OM has achieved! Congratulations to the entire GCV Community!

Some pioneers have questioned why we have not achieved OM today. I want to clarify that our Global GCV CT and all country-specific GCV CTs have done a wonderful job. We have reached our goal: GCV has accelerated in nearly all countries. Many pioneers have stepped up to support GCV, and barters

are happening every day, often every hour, worldwide. Numerous merchants are registering on MapofPi with GCV. This is an amazing achievement for the Global GCV CT, and our Executive Committee members have contributed greatly. This achievement is the foundation that CT unblocked many tentative and pending KYC applications, increasing the migration speed today.

I would like to extend a special thanks to Committee Chair Ms. Lumari, Vice Chair Ms. Nonny, Chair Assistant Mr. Jojo, and members Mr. Iyanda and Mr. Kiavash. Additionally, the contributions from our strong communities in Africa, the Arab region, and Latin America have been commendable. A special shout-out goes to all the GCV Ambassadors from countries such as the Philippines, Indonesia, Malaysia, and China especially Taiwan China area, who have played a significant role in our success today!

Now, let's look at what's happening based on the reactions from CT. Just a few minutes ago, we reached 7,503,885 wallets! Some pioneers reported that over 80,000 wallets have migrated today in less than 24 hours, and many pioneers have successfully passed KYC. Numerous tentative accounts are turning green today and many wallets have migrated to Pi today! Can we see CT have confidence on us?

This achievement is no coincidence; it reflects the hard work of our entire GCV

promise. Why is CT take action today? Because we set December 12, 2024, as our target date to reach our goal, and we achieved it! CT acknowledged our commitment and collaborate with our goal!

From personal estimate, CT will expedite the KYC and migration process over the remaining 19 days, aiming for 10 million migrations if we continue our efforts. I estimate that starting December 16, CT will accelerate their pace. From now until December 16, they will increase their testing efforts. CT announced that they can double their migration speed capacity before June 28. Previously, the highest speed they achieved was almost 70,000 wallets in one day before June 28th, so I estimate they can reach full capacity since December 16, 2024, targeting 140,000 to 150,000 wallets per day. The reason is there is 14 days safe periods when pioneers cannot use their Pi after migration.

Attention all GCV Ambassadors and pioneers: please continue assisting community pioneers in completing their KYC, setting up migrations, and fulfilling other necessary tasks. It is also essential to promote GCV education and register businesses on MapofPi. After the OM, we need to focus on educating and expanding the ecosystem to ensure that the remaining 50 million pioneers can migrate quickly. The speed of this process relies on the collective efforts of the Pi community.

In the initial three months following the OM, we will see external businesses gradually joining. Therefore, we must work diligently to maintain a stable and successful Pi Network. Once we establish a strong and stable foundation, a significant number of businesses and institutions will be ready to join us.

All global pioneers, let's harness our efforts during these 19 days to demonstrate to CT our readiness and unwavering support for GCV, with a strong focus on education and ecosystem development. Our collective behavior will shape their decisions, so let's unite. Release all negative thoughts and doubts. Embrace full confidence in CT, GCV, and in yourselves.????



Team Philippines lords it over 11th BIMP-EAGA Games

Team Philippines snared 52 of 88 gold medals in the 11th BIMP-EAGA (Brunei Darussalam-Indonesia-Malaysia-Philippines-East ASEAN Growth Area) Friendship Games that ended here Thursday.

Team A (Davao Region) was the winningest of five Philippines delegations and overall, finishing with a 31-39-22 gold-silver-bronze tally.

De La Salle swimmer Philip Adrian Sahagun starred for Team PH-A by sweeping all his five events -- boys' 200 Individual Medley, 4x100 freestyle and medley relays, and 200m and 100m backstroke.

Also bringing pride to the region are trackster Milchay Moreno and swimmer Lora Micah Amoguis, who had two golds and a silver; and karateka Jamie Danielle Nirza finished with a gold and a silver.

Malaysia B (17-16-19) came in second; Indonesia (14-8-6) was third; and Team PH-E or Puerto Princesa fourth (13-8-11).

University of the Philippines swimming standout and this city's pride, Quendy Fernandez, 19, was the most bemedalled with five golds (girls' 50m, 100m and 200m back, 4x50m medley and freestyle relays) and two silvers (4x100m medley and 4x100m free).

All delegations clinched at least one gold medal -Team PH-B or General

province (6-6-10), Brunei Darussalam (3-2-8), Malaysia A (2-4-3), Team PH-C or Bangsamoro (1-3-4) and Team PH-D or Palawan province (1-2-10).

On Wednesday afternoon, Team PH-E conquered esports event Mobile Legends: Bang Bang, winning 3-1 over Team PH-D.

Malaysia and Team PH-A took the bronze.

At Palawan State University gym, Indonesia's men's and women's sepak takraw teams beat Team PH-A squads.

Philippine Sports Commissioner Walter Torres delivered the message of Chair Richard Bachmann at the closing ceremony at Balayong basketball covered court, thanking the country's EAGA neighbors for sending their athletes.

Malaysia was also announced as the next host of the biennial meet. A dinner and party for

all delegates followed.
The Philippines is encouraging investors to look at Philippine EAGA routes as potent connectivity and investment jump-off points.

The short course includes the Organizing Major Sports Events and Promoting Sports Tourism program, which intends to "upskill" participants with the science behind sports tourism, alongside its financial and administrative challenges from local to international level.

It also covered planning and execution of major sports events, practical problem-solving, decisionmaking exercises, and case studies.

Commission on Higher Education (CHED)

Chairperson J. Prospero de Vera III, in a statement Tuesday, said training of the representatives from various HEIs nationwide was funded by the agency.

He said the program "was developed consistent with the ASEAN (Association of South East Asian Nations) work plan on sports for 2021-2025 and affirms the ASEAN Senior Officials Meeting on Sports declaration on the importance of sports in community building and achieving the sustainable development goals."

"CHED is proud to collaborate with UKM in contributing to these regional undertakings and to help strengthen the Philippine sports industry," he said.

"We look forward to how our participants can now plan and implement follow-through activities in their HEIs, and athletic leagues, and partner with local governments when they go back to the Philippines," he added. (PNA)

Antique allots P54-M to prepare facilities for 2025 reg'l sports meet

The provincial government of Antique has allocated PHP54 million for facilities in preparation for hosting the 2025 Western Visayas Regional Athletic Association (WVRAA) Meet.

The Provincial Engineering Office, led by Engineer Inocencio Dajao Jr., is now in Metro Manila for the post-qualification process of the winning bidder for the repair of the rubberized oval track at the Binirayan Sports Complex in San Jose de Buenavista.

"We are trying to validate the previous performance of the winning bidder to ensure that they can properly carry out the needed repair of our rubberized oval track," Dajao said in an interview.

The repair of the Binirayan Sports Complex oval track got the biggest chunk of the budget at PHP29 million. Its last repair was in 2016 when the province hosted the WVRAA and the Palarong Pambansa.

Dajao added that they bid for 12 schools that would serve as billeting areas for the athletes





Over 260 employees retrenched from First Orient International Ventures Inc. and K3 Global Services Inc., companies operating as Philippine Offshore Gaming Operators (POGOs) at Island Cove in Kawit, Cavite, have received their final, 13th-month, and separation payments.

The Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE)-Cavite Provincial Office facilitated the payout as part of its comprehensive support for workers affected by the closure of the Internet Gaming Licensees.

The companires shut down on Nov. 30.

"We worked closely together with Provincial Director Marivic Martinez to verify the computations of the separation pay and assist workers in claiming their SSS (Social Security System) unemployment benefits," Ruth Terrible, Senior Labor and Employment Officer of DOLE-Cavite, said in a statement.

"This initiative underscores DOLE's dedication to prioritizing the welfare of displaced workers and ensuring they receive what is due to them."

Some workers, especially those with five years of employment, received amounts ranging from PHP170,000 to PHP180,000, while payouts for others varied based on their length of service.

Terrible also shared that six workers who were not able to attend the payout will receive their claims in February next year.

Approximately 400 employees already received their separation pay in an earlier distribution. **POGO WORKERS • 7**
