Disaster Education for students using 3D City Model with Minecraft

The Cavite Industrial Area-Flood Risk Management Project (CIA-FRIMP) and the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH), in coordination with the Municipal Government of Kawit through its Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office, spearheaded an Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) activity on disaster management for flood preparedness using an innovative 3D city model on January 15 to 16, 2025, at Emiliano Tria Tirona Memorial National Integrated High School in Kawit, Cavite.

A lecture on Flood Education using a 3D city Model with Minecraft was led by Mr. Keisuke Ono, Lecturer at Tohoku Institute of Technology in Japan, engaging 400

Grade 7 student attendees as part of the mission to instill disaster resilience among the youth.

The two-day initiative aimed to educate students about flood risks, preparedness measures, and the significance of community involvement in mitigating disaster impacts. The interactive 3D city model and Minecraft served as a powerful visual tool, allowing students to better understand flood scenarios and how these can affect their locality. By simulating real-life situations, students were able to visualize flood-prone areas, learn evacuation routes, and explore strategies to minimize risks.

Facilitators from CIA-FRIMP and Tohoku Institute of Technology guided the students through discussions on the causes of flooding, its structural and non-structural measures, and disaster education for flood management using 3D City Model with the popular video game Minecraft. The engaging nature of the activity encouraged active participation and fostered a deeper understanding of disaster risk reduction.

The IEC activity underscores the commitment of CIA-FRIMP, Provincial Government of Cavite and the local government of Kawit to building a safer and more resilient community by educating the younger generation on disaster preparedness. *(OPIO)*

Furthermore, RA 7394 also provides that an establishment that wishes to conduct sales promotion activities shall first secure a permit from the DTI prior to the commencement of their sales promotion activities. Common sales promotion schemes include, but not limited to, discounts, premiums, raffles, and contests.

Fire breaks out in residential area in Bacoor, Cavite

A fire broke out in a residential area in Bacoor City, Cavite on Monday morning.

The fire in Barangay Zapote I started before 5 a.m., according to a report by James Agustin on Unang Balita.

The Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) raised the third alarm past 6 a.m.

A total of 13 firetrucks from the BFP and more from volunteer groups were deployed to respond to the fire.

Due to the narrow streets, firefighters had to go to a vacant lot to get close to the affected houses. Some of them climbed over the roof of nearby establishments.

According to the residents, the blaze was already huge when they woke up. Some of them were able to save appliances and clothes

from the fire.

Affected residents are asking for assistance.

In his presentation, Alcudia emphasized the importance of linking Parent-Teacher Associations with Hands Off Our Children Movement, Inc., a group of parents advocating for awareness programs to protect the youth from being recruited into violent armed struggles.

Alcudia said he recommended several measures to strengthen the partnership between DepEd and the military, including harmonizing DepEd Order No. 32, s.

2019, which outlines The National Policy Framework on Learners and Schools as Zones of Peace, with the directives of the National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict.

This alignment would enhance efforts to combat communist recruitment within the educational sector.

A d d i t i o n a l recommendations included conducting information campaigns in secondary schools across Calabarzon, incorporating orientation sessions on the

National Service Training Program for Grade 12 students, and inviting security sector representatives to DepEd career guidance programs to encourage students to consider careers in the uniformed services.

During the meeting, Alcudia also addressed maritime challenges in the West Philippine Sea and stressed the importance of raising national security awareness among the youth.

"By sharing our commitment with DepEd on these critical issues, we can protect and empower our future generations," he concluded. (PNA)

members' benefits.

"Our reserve funds are adequate due to prudent financial management, and all programs are being implemented as usual. No benefit packages will be reduced or removed this year," he said, noting that the state insurer still has PHP29.9 billion in reserve funds.

Ledesma also highlighted significant improvements in PhilHealth benefit packages last year, including a 95 percent increase in the all-case rate coverage.

He said new benefit packages have been introduced, and existing ones have been expanded.

These include breast cancer treatment coverage increased by 1,300 percent; hemodialysis package increased by 144 percent; substantial coverage increases in cardiovascular diseases like heart attack, stroke,

and ischemic heart disease; kidney transplantation (Z benefit package) coverage expanded to include procedures for living and deceased donors, with funding of up to PHP2.15 million; Z benefit package now includes 10 rare conditions, including Maple Syrup Urine Disease and Osteogenesis Imperfecta.

Preventive health measures were also enhanced, with oral health services included in the Konsulta program, providing dental care for members, including children aged 0 to 15.

"This year, we aim to intensify efforts to improve efficiency and reduce administrative costs to ensure that every peso contributes to better health outcomes," he said.

While acknowledging challenges, Ledesma expressed confidence in PhilHealth's ability to sustain its role as the

national health insurer and contribute to the broader goal of universal health coverage.

"PhilHealth is facing a pivotal moment, but I assure our members that we are equipped to overcome these challenges and continue fulfilling our mandate," he said.

"We can assure each and every member of PhilHealth, huwag po kayong mangamba. Huwag po kayong matakot pumunta sa ospital at sa doktor, sagot po kayo ng PhilHealth (do not hesitate. Do not be afraid of going to the hospital and the doctor, PhilHealth has you covered), rest assured," he added.

Starting Jan. 1, PhilHealth has increased the case rates of 9,000 packages by 50 percent.

Ledesma has earlier assured members that the new and expanded benefit packages will not result in a premium hike this year or in the coming years. (PNA)

digitization of the health system.

To combat these, Herbosa said the agency focused its efforts on health promotion, disease prevention, and acute and emergency care.

Bagong Urgent Care and
Ambulatory Services
(BUCAS) Centers to bring
the best urgent care and
ambulatory services to the
poorest families.

Twenty of the centers are in Luzon, eight are in Visayas and 14 are in Mindanao. They are open from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Herbosa said family and community medicine doctors were assigned in the centers.

Free basic healthcare services are provided through the 83 Bagong Pilipinas (New Philippines) mobile clinics with complete equipment such as digital X-ray, CT scan, ultrasound, hematology analyzer for blood tests. binocular microscope, ophthalmoscope for eye tests, lab-grade refrigerator and telemedicine equipment

Several hospitals are also up for expansion,

Herbosa said, citing as an example the multispecialty center built in Clark, Pampanga.

"We are expanding many hospitals: heart centers, specialty centers sa iba't ibang parte ng Pilipinas, utos ni President van (nationwide, that's the President's order). OW TO BE AN EFFECTIVE HEAD OF GCV AMBASSADOR/LEADERS?

Network community, particularly within our GCV community, we have established a robust framework of GCV Ambassadors. However, it is important to acknowledge that many of our Ambassadors may not yet the leadership possess experience necessary for community management. As we strive for accelerated growth in various countries and local regions, we invite more pioneers to join us in fulfilling our educational and ecological responsibilities. The role of the head of GCV Ambassadors

is crucial in identifying and nurturing potential leaders within our community to fortify our GCV ecosystem and education system.

To shed light on effective leadership, I would like to draw upon the example of a revered Chinese emperor from the Kingdom of Shu during the Three Kingdoms period. It is my hope that our GCV Ambassadors can derive meaningful insights from

Liu Bei, an eminent figure in the Three Kingdoms era, played a pivotal role in the establishment of the Kingdom of Shu, engaging with the Kingdom of Wu and the Kingdom of Wei. Unlike his contemporaries, Cao Cao and Sun Quan, Liu Bei did not possess significant financial resources or territorial claims. Furthermore, he may not have excelled in strategy or knowledge to the same extent. However, Liu Bei was renowned for his loyalty, integrity, and ability to forge strong relationships. His focus on "human capital" truly distinguished him as a leader, and several key principles can be highlighted:

1. *Recognition of Talent and Strategic Assignments: * A successful leader should first engage in self-reflection and subsequently strive to understand the strengths and weaknesses of their team members. Rather than assuming all responsibilities, an effective leader recognizes the unique talents of each individual, positions them accordingly, and empowers them to harness their full potential. Liu Bei exemplified this approach by aligning individuals such as Guan Yu, Zhang Fei, and Zhao Yun with roles that capitalized on their strengths, resulting in numerous victories for Shu. The head of GCV Ambassadors should recognize the achievements of your subordinates or team to motivate them to perform at their best.

2. *Fostering Trust and Empowerment:* Although Liu Bei may not have been as strategic as Cao Cao or Sun Quan, he excelled in leveraging the skills of those

to make decisions was paramount. For instance, after earnestly seeking Zhuge Liang's counsel, Liu Bei entrusted him with major military affairs, allowing Zhuge Liang the autonomy to demonstrate his exceptional leadership capabilities. Trust and autonomy are very important. A good leader should empower their subordinates while also guiding them along the correct path and providing support. When leaders hoard power and are unwilling to delegate, it can lead to conflict among team members as

3. *Exemplifying Kindness and Loyalty: * Liu Bei's kindness and generosity stood out throughout his leadership journey. By sharing both challenges and successes with his subordinates, he fostered loyalty and devotion among his followers. Unlike other leaders who may resent their supporters during times of prosperity, Liu Bei remained committed to treating others with respect and appreciation, attracting

talented individuals eager to join his cause.

4. *Encouraging Unity and Collaboration:* Achieving significant goals necessitates collaboration and a unified approach. Liu Bei's faithfulness to his friends and loyalty to his team were hallmarks of his leadership. By maintaining a commitment to nurturing relationships during both favorable and challenging times, he garnered respect and admiration, encouraging many to align themselves with his vision. The Head of GCV Ambassadors should focus on fostering unity and collaboration rather than getting caught up in the details. The unity of our GCV community is crucial. If the Head of GCV Ambassadors does not effectively support their team, conflicts may arise, which can hinder our efficiency. It is important to remember that we are united for GCV, not for individual recognition or personal agendas. Therefore, the Head of GCV Ambassadors should make decisions based solely on the principles of GCV unity, avoiding the pursuit of personal fame or power in the name of unity.

In conclusion, Liu Bei stands as a testament to the power of understanding, empathy, and empowerment in leadership. By truly caring for and respecting the individuals he led, he created an environment conducive to growth and development, earning the loyalty of his team and ultimately forming an indomitable alliance. This example serves as a valuable reminder that effective leadership is rooted in building meaningful relationships, empowering others, and cultivating a strong, cohesive

NEDA, in partnership with the Korea Trade-Investment Promotion Agency (KOTRA), kicked off the inaugural meeting of the Korean-Philippine Economic Innovation Partnership Program (EIPP) on Jan. 16 at the New World Hotel in Makati

Ín a statement, NEDA said the meeting outlined comprehensive plans for three digital infrastructure projects to be developed under the EIPP, which aims to improve information and communications technology (ICT) in the Philippines.

National Communications Satellite Roadmap for the Philippines, establishment of an Implementation Plan for the Philippine Government Master Plan, and the Establishment of an Implementation Plan for the Philippines for an Integrated Data Center.

The National **Communications Satellite** Roadmap aims establish a robust industrial ecosystem for the telecommunications satellite sector in the Philippines.

to be used in the May 12 midterm polls.

Ballot printing is at the last part of this. There is a long process involved in ballot printing. Most probably, we can restart our production by (middle) of next week, Comelec spokesperson John Rex Laudiangco said in an interview Friday.

Printing activities will still be at the National Printing Office in Quezon City.

Laudiangco said they need to apply the necessary changes in the election management system (EMS), automated counting machines, and consolidation canvassing system before they can restart printing.

"There are extensive changes and amendments necessary to be done in the EMS," Laudiangco said.

The Comelec will likewise conduct the new trusted build process with

international their certification entity, Pro V&V, and generate the new ballot face templates and serialization.

"We have to complete all of these processes before we even reach ballot printing," he added.
The Comelec on

Tuesday suspended ballot printing, in connection with the five temporary restraining orders issued

by the Supreme Court against the poll body and its decisions to declare as nuisance or disqualify political aspirants.

With this, the poll body has to destroy six million ballots that were earlier printed.

Meanwhile, Madis will try bounce back when she competes in the 3rd UAE ITF Juniors which will start on Jan. 20.

Madis, who bagged six singles and five doubles titles last year, registered a career-high No. 207 in the ITF Juniors rankings last Jan. 5. She won the doubles with PTA teammate Stefi Marithe Aludo in the J60 events in Manila, China, Thailand and Sri Lanka. (PNA)

"We are ready. We are ironing out all the preparations for a smooth hosting of the 2025 Cordillera Administrative Region Athletic Association (CARAA) meet on February 23 to 28," said Governor Melchor Diclas on the sidelines of the joint preparation meeting with the Department of Education (DepEd)-CAR and other government agencies here Thursday.

Diclas explained that the budget includes allotment for transportation and supplies, including medicines, since they are expecting further drop in temperature.

He said they have also advised the DepEd-CAR to issue advisories to the schools division offices of Abra, Apayao, Ifugao, Kalinga, Mountain Province and Tabuk City to ensure that their athletes have thick clothes and additional blankets.

Benguet's temperature is lower by two degrees Celsius compared to Baguio City, which is forecasts to have around 9 degree Celsius temperature by February.

Dr. Estela Cariño, DepEd-CAR director, in a separate interview, said weather will be among the topics to be discussed during her meeting with the schools division officials next week.

"We will inform them of the weather and temperature here in Benguet to make sure that their athletes will bring with them the necessary warm clothes and additional beddings with them for a

warm sleep," she said. The provincial

government is also looking into the possibility of procuring sleeping bags for the athletes as well as Vitamin C, she added.

Getting ready

The governor said athletes from Benguet have started to train with experts, such as international kickboxing players whose training gymnasiums are in Benguet.

"We are thankful to them because they are volunteering to help our athletes," she said.

Meanwhile, Sablan Mayor Alfredo Dacumos said they hope to retain their top spot in volleyball.

"I do not know how we started but it had been decades that volleyball is the community sport event in the municipality," he said. (PNA) The 33-year-old the weightlifter from co Barangay Mampang in Zamboanga City tradelivered the country's Defirst Olympic gold medal at the 2020 Tokyo Fa

Diaz will share center stage with gymnast Carlos Yulo, who will be honored as Athlete of the Year in the grand celebration by the country's oldest media organization headed by its president Nelson Beltran, sports editor of

The Philippine Star. Yulo, 24, scored a rare double gold by topping the men's floor exercise and vault at the Paris Olympics.

Diaz is the latest athlete to be elevated in

the Hall of Fame by the country's sports writing fraternity since the late track and field great Lydia De Vega in 2022.

The other Hall of Famers were bowlers Paeng Nepomuceno and Bong Coo, chess grandmaster Eugene Torre, pool idol Efren 'Bata' Reyes, the late FIDE president Florencio Campomanes, and boxer Manny Pacquiao.

Diaz is a daughter of a tricycle driver who turned into farming and fishing. She began lifting weights using makeshift barbels at the age of nine.

Her first competition was the 2002 Batang Pinoy and later joined the national pool.

Diaz bagged her first

medal (bronze) at the 2007 Southeast Asian Games in Nakhon Ratchasima when she was 16 and a year later, made her Olympic debut at the 2008 Beijing Games as a wild card entry

She also qualified for the London Olympics but failed to make the podium for the second time

Diaz, a gold-medalist in the World Championships, Asian Championships, Asian Games, and the SEA Games, got the silver medal in the women's 53kg category at the 2016 Rio Olympics, the country's first medal after two decades. (PNA)





For this reason, the Marcos administration ensures that the Department of Health (DOH) would be able to deliver healthcare services without any interruption.

In a Bagong Pilipinas Ngayon interview, Health Secretary Teodoro Herbosa said the DOH has received a PHP267.8 billion budget for this year, the biggest in its history, under the current administration.

"Technically, 'yung sinasabi niyang 'wag kayong mag-alala sa kalusugan, nilalagyan niya talaga ng budget (Technically, he allotted

budget for health when he told the public not to worry about their health)," he said.

He noted that Marcos has legacy projects such as cancer and children's centers with funds to ensure their construction.

"PBBM is putting money where his mouth his. Kapag sinabi niyang dagdagan ng pondo ang kalusugan, dinagdagan niya ang pondo (He increased the fund for healthcare services when he said he would)," he added.

Following the signing of the 2025 national budget

in December last year, Marcos instructed Herbosa to guarantee the provision of health benefit packages to all members of the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth) despite the state insurer's zero government subsidy.

Coming out of the pandemic, the DOH encountered challenges in nutrition, immunization, maternal mortality, tuberculosis, HIV, hepatitis, non-communicable diseases like diabetes and hypertension, mental health, cancer and
